## **Programs and Courses**

#### **Major and Minor in Black Studies**

Open to all Western students, the new Major and Minor in Black Studies offers a variety of local, national and global disciplinary perspectives on Black history, culture and heritage. One focus, given Canada's proximity to the United States, is how race plays out there – including how government race policies generated resistance both historically, with the Civil Rights Movement, and currently with Black Lives Matter.

Students from all backgrounds and disciplines can enrich their studies at Western through exciting new courses, such as <a href="Introduction to Black/African Diaspora">Introduction to Black/African Diaspora</a>, <a href="Black Popular Culture Today">Black</a> <a href="Black Popular Culture Today">Geographies</a>, and <a href="From Du Bois to Black Panther: Black Popular Culture Today">From Du Bois to Black Panther: Black Popular Culture Today</a>. There are also a number of community-engaged learning opportunities for students through course work to better situate their studies in the real world and provide hands-on experiences that bring their course discussions to life.

## **Faculty of Education Equity Admissions Pathway**

Western's Faculty of Education is strongly committed to equity, diversity and inclusivity in all that we do. One of the ways that we do this is through recruiting and supporting applicants to our initial teacher education program who reflect the student population in Ontario schools. Specifically, it is our goal to admit and support more Indigenous and Black teacher candidates, women teacher candidates, teacher candidates living with disability, and LGBTQ2S+ teacher candidates and other equity deserving or underrepresented groups. We recognize that this starts with recruitment of a diverse range of applicants into our

initial teacher education programs and we enthusiastically encourage individuals from all equity deserving groups to apply.

#### **Western Law - Prospective Black Law Students**

Eligible students will receive a package valued at over \$1000 that includes: A voucher for the \$200 Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) application fee; A waiver of Western's Faculty of Law application fee (\$115); and Princeton Review's **LSAT Fundamentals** LSAT Prep Course, which includes: 30 hours of virtual class prep with an expert instructor, Online lessons to help reinforce your in-class prep, 4 practice tests (to be self-proctored at home), Online score reports with detailed explanations, 150+ hours of additional videos and online content, and Access to 60+ full Official LSAT PrepTests™

## J.D. Admission Pathway for Black Law Student Applicants

Black applicants are individuals who self-identify as members of the Black community. The Faculty of Law recognizes that such individuals are not represented adequately within the legal profession and strongly encourages applications from members of this group. Applications from Black candidates will be reviewed holistically, informed by the principles of equity, diversity, and inclusion. Candidates may use the optional essay to discuss lived experiences, which will be given additional weight during the review process. We are striving to have all applications in this category assessed by at least one Black reviewer (among two reviewers).

#### **Ivey University Pathways Program (UPP)**

The University Pathways Program (UPP) is a tri-school partnership between Ivey (Western), Smith (Queen's), and Schulich (York) designed to provide students with opportunities for self-reflective, experiential, and identity development opportunities, essential for comprehensively exploring the benefits of a business school education. The University Pathways Program is a free, limited enrolment program. Participants are selected through

an application process. Currently the program is only open to **Black students in the Greater Toronto Area.** The program starts in Grade 11 and continues through to high school graduation.

#### Schulich School of Medicine and Dentistry Black Applicant Pathway (BAP)

The Black Applicant Pathway (BAP) was established in recognition of the damage caused by years of racism and systemic bias against Black people that has resulted in significant underrepresentation in institutions of higher learning. It is hoped that the BAP will be one way of reducing challenges faced by Black applicants to medical school.

### The James Alexander and Ellen Rea Benson Special Collections

The James Alexander and Ellen Rea Benson Special Collections contributes to Western Archives' antiquarian and rare book holdings. The Benson Special Collections was established in 1934 as the Treasure Room Collection. It was located on the first floor of the Lawson Memorial Library, now known as Lawson Hall. From 1966-1971, the Treasure Room Collection was housed in a closed-off section of the library stacks. Includes rare books on Canadian Black history and abolitionism.

## **Additional Learning Opportunities**

#### **Unpacking and Addressing: Anti-Black Racism**

Anti-Black racism in North America is a legacy of not just colonialism but essentially the transatlantic slave trade and the subsequent mistreatment of Black people following the abolition of slavery. This module provides some insight into some common terms related to anti-Black racism, alongside a review of the different ways anti-Black racism has been manifested. Learn some practical strategies that can be used to address anti-Black racism in your day-to-day lives.

After completing this module, you will be able to:

- Define anti-Black racism and related concepts.
- Identify the harmful impact that historical Canadian laws and policies have had on Black Canadians and Black populations.
- Identify the harmful impact contemporary Canadian attitudes and social trends have had on Black Communities.

 Take action when encountering anti-Black racism in interpersonal and institutional settings.

This module can be applied to the Award of Achievement in Anti-Oppression and the Anti-Oppression Certificate Program offered by the Office of Equity, Diversity and Inclusion at Western.

This micro-course explores some of the major histories, migrations, artists and activists that have contributed to the presence and survival of Black people in Canada. The course tracks Canada's evolving relationship to Blackness and Black people, while inviting learners to reflect upon the ways Canadian views of race and multiculturalism have influenced Black communities throughout the country. We invite you to reflect, dream, and think alongside some of today's most prominent Black intellectuals as we examine the history of Black presence in Canada, and imagine vibrant Black Canadian futures.
